Tacoma, WA (October 26, 2023): The Washington State Parent Teacher Association (WSPTA) held its 45th Annual Legislative Assembly virtually this weekend, October 21-22. Delegates met to consider four new resolutions, one new issue, and amendments to one issue and two current resolutions in support of the association's vision of *making every child's potential a reality*.

WSPTA's priority issues, resolutions, and legislative principles support the delivery of the association's mission:

- PTA is a strong advocate for the well-being and education of every child.
