SB 5187 Student transportation Big 3: Providing adequate and predictable student transportation. Directs OSPI to provide an analysis of school district transportation costs and allocations following the 2026-27 school year to the education and fiscal committees of the legislature by June 1, 2028. The analysis must be used to develop a new model, including the transportation needs of students who are homeless, in the foster care system, attending skill centers and students who receive transportation due to special needs. The analysis must consider unique issues of urban districts and rural districts with geographical challenges. (b) Each student must meet high school learning standards related to financial education in order to graduate from high school, beginning with the earlier of the graduating class (i) of 2033 or (ii) as recommended by the state board of education. By December 15, 2025, school districts are required to submit to the State Board of Education and Financial Education Public Private Partnership: (i) A list of courses and other learning opportunities offered on financial education for high school students in their district during or prior to the 2024-25 school year and the number of students served by those offerings; and (ii) A description of what the school district may need in order to ensure that students are able to meet the graduation requirement established in subsection (1)(b) of this section.
